# Grants Support Core National Preparedness Goal Priorities

- **NIMS/NRP Implementation**
- **National Infrastructure Protection Plan (NIPP) Implementation**
  - Focus Area: Build and Sustain a Statewide Critical Infrastructure/Key Resource (CI/KR) Protection Program
- **Information Sharing**
  - Focus Area: Enable Information/Intelligence Fusion

# Grant Administration/Delivery Structures

- DHS-FEMA does not mandate specific State/local structures for the administration of grant programs, but those are subject to both DHS-FEMA, other DHS and OMB regulations and guidelines
- Most DHS and DHS-FEMA grants available are administered by the HQ Capabilities Division, National Preparedness Directorate and the Infrastructure Protection Directorate (changes being made)
- In the States, a single, State Administrative Agency (SAA) has been designated as the administration entity for HS grants
- States differ in SAA designations and “delivery” agencies
- States/locals/Tribes and/or others (some non-profits) subject to grants management regulations and guidance and ALL required to be NIMS compliant to receive grants (any grants for preparedness from any Federal D/A and their grant programs).
- DHS-FEMA Preparedness Officers are primary lead and POC for grants/assistance from DHS

# State Administrative Agency (SAA)

- Each State and territory has a gubernatorial-appointed contact responsible for managing all NPD funds and associated program requirements
- The SAA should be the main point of contact as they are the initial recipient of all grant awards

## Preparedness Officers

- Assigned each State, these highly trained individuals perform a variety of technical and strategic consulting on grants matters and lead a team of HS/EM experts to provide brokering of information and grant monitoring

# FY 2007 HSGP

## *State Homeland Security Program (SHSP)*

Supports building and sustaining capabilities at state/local levels

- Focus on prevention, protection, response, and recovery
- Provides funding to all 56 states and territories
- Funding is determined based on a combination of
  - A Congressionally-mandated formula,
  - Effectiveness in identifying proposed initiatives, and
  - Risk methodology

# FY 2007 HSGP

## *Urban Areas Security Initiative Program (UASI)*

High-threat, high population density urban areas

- Assists in building and sustaining capability
- Focus on prevention, protection, response, and recovery
- Funding is determined based on a combination of
  - Effectiveness in identifying proposed initiatives, and
  - Risk methodology
- ***NOTE: Atlanta, Charlotte, Ft Lauderdale, Jacksonville, Memphis, Miami, Orlando and Tampa are the Region IV UASIs.***

Data: Gross Metropolitan Product (UASI) / % GDP (State analysis)

# FY 2007 HSGP

## *Law Enforcement Terrorism Prevention Program (LETPP)*

Builds state and local law enforcement capabilities to prevent terrorist attacks

- Provides funds to support critical protection activities
- Provides funding to all 56 states and territories
- Funding to states and territories is determined based on a combination of
  - A Congressionally-mandated formula, and
  - Effectiveness in identifying proposed initiatives

# FY 2007 HSGP

## *Metropolitan Medical Response System (MMRS)*

Targets designated metropolitan areas to sustain and enhance medical mass casualty preparedness and response

- Provides funding to 124 jurisdictions
- Funding is determined based on formula
- Originally in HHS via contracts, now grants in DHS-FEMA

***NOTE: Huntsville, Birmingham, Montgomery, Mobile, Jackson, Memphis, Chattanooga, Knoxville, Nashville, Louisville, Lexington, Raleigh, Charlotte, Greensboro, Columbia, Atlanta, Columbus, Ft Lauderdale, Miami, Tampa, Jacksonville, Hialeah, Orlando, St Petersburg***

# FY 2007 HSGP

## *Citizen Corps Program*

Supports Citizen Corps Councils and CERT development with emphasis on efforts to engage citizens in

- Personal preparedness
- Ongoing volunteer programs
- Surge capacity response
- Participation in state and local preparedness exercises
- Provides funding to all 56 states and territories
- Funding is determined based on formula

# FY 2007 IPP

## *Transit Security Grant Program*

Sustainable, risk-based effort for protection of critical transit infrastructure

- Funding provided to owners and operators of nation's critical transit infrastructure, including
  - Rail
  - Intra-city Bus Systems
  - Ferry Systems
  - Amtrak

# FY 2007 IPP

## *Port Security Grant Program*

Sustainable, risk-based effort for protection of critical port infrastructure

- Competitive funding to highest-risk ports as well as ports covered by an Area Maritime Security Plan
- 5 funding priorities within the Port Security Grant Program

# FY 2007 IPP

## *Intercity Bus Security Grant Program*

Protection of intercity bus systems and the traveling public

- Competitive funding to eligible charter and fixed route intercity bus systems servicing UASI jurisdictions
- Two-tiered funding system
- 5 funding priorities within the Intercity Bus Security Grant Program

# FY 2007 IPP

## *Trucking Security Grant Program*

Provides funding to the American Trucking Association for preparedness and watch/warning purposes

- Sustains the Highway Watch® Program to enhance homeland security through increased vigilance and awareness on the Nation's highways
- Grant priorities include:
  - Participant identification and recruitment
  - Maintaining the full-time Highway Watch Call Center

# FY 2007 IPP

## *Buffer Zone Protection Program*

Provides grant funding to build security and risk-management capabilities at the State and local level to secure pre-identified Tier I and Tier II critical infrastructure sites (within 46 states), including

- chemical facilities
- financial institutions
- nuclear and electric power plants
- dams
- stadiums, and
- other high-risk/high-consequence facilities (arenas, etc.)

- Emergency Management Performance Grant
- Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program
- Competitive Training Grant Program
- Commercial Equipment Direct Assistance Program
- Nonprofit Security Grant Program

# FY 2007 Grant Programs

## *Emergency Management Performance Grant*

Assists state and local governments (including some Tribes) to sustain and enhance the effectiveness of their emergency management program

- Provides funding by formula basis to all 56 states and territories as well as the Federated States of Micronesia and the Republic of the Marshall Islands
- Program application deadline is typically middle of the first quarter in the Fiscal Year; awards are typically at the end of the Calendar Year
- Funds through the SAA to the State EMA and then to locals/Tribes
- One of few grant programs specifically for personnel

# FY 2007 Grant Programs

## *Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) Program*

Provides resources directly to fire departments and emergency medical services (EMS) organizations to obtain critically needed

- Equipment
- Protective gear
- Emergency vehicles
- Training, and
- Other resources needed to protect the public and emergency personnel from fire and related hazards
- Very popular – some increased emphasis in this FY 07 to “reach” those FDs not previously awarded funds (typically smaller, less “grant savvy” jurisdictions)

# FY 2007 Grant Programs

## *Competitive Training Grant Program*

Supports innovative national preparedness training programs that emphasize a cross-disciplinary approach to training, partnerships to maximize program impact, and strong program performance measures

- Proposals from wide range of applicants

# FY 2007 Grant Programs

## *Commercial Equipment Direct Assistance Program (CEDAP)*

Provides equipment and equipment training directly to smaller communities

- Equipment includes:
  - Personal Protective Equipment
  - Thermal Imaging, Night Vision, and Video Surveillance
  - Chemical, Biological, and Radiological Detection Equipment
  - Information Technology
  - Risk Management
  - Tactical Communications Gateways

# FY 2007 Grant Programs

## *Nonprofit Security Grant Program*

501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations who are deemed high-risk of a potential international terrorist attack

- Eligible to those nonprofits located within the 46 designated UASI areas
- Enable nonprofit organizations at high risk to take precautionary and preventative measures
- Eligible organizations may apply for an award of up to \$100,000 and must agree to match 25 percent of Federal grant funds in cash or through equivalent, related training
- Funds can be used for target-hardening activities or training

# FY 2007 Grant Programs

## *Public Safety Interoperable Communications Program*

Funding to States and Territories starting in FY 2007 to enable and enhance public safety agencies' interoperable communications capabilities, specifically in the acquisition of, deployment of, or training for the use of systems that utilizes 700 MHz bands

- Up to five percent of total available funds will be disbursed to grantees in FY 2007 to ensure that PSIC grant requirements will be incorporated into the Statewide Interoperable Communications Plans that are due September 30, 2007
- Remaining funding to be disbursed upon final approval of Statewide Interoperable Communications Plans

# Allowable Equipment Categories

- Grantees may purchase first responder equipment in the following categories (number of categories has increased every year):
  - Personal Protective Equipment (PPE).
  - Detection Equipment
  - Decontamination Equipment
  - Interoperable Communications Equipment
  - Terrorism Incident Prevention Equipment
  - Explosive Device Mitigation and Remediation Equipment
  - Physical Security Enhancement Equipment
  - Medical Supplies/Pharmaceuticals
  - CBRNE Logistical Support Equipment
  - CBRNE Incident Response Vehicles/Aircraft/Watercraft
  - CBRNE Search & Rescue Equipment
  - CBRNE Reference Materials
  - Agricultural Terrorism Prevention, Response & Mitigation
  - Cyber Security
  - Intervention Equipment
  - Citizen Corps specific equipment



# Planning

- Establishment and development of mutual aid agreements
- Development or enhancement of response and recovery plans
- Coordination of citizen and family preparedness plans and programs, including donations programs and volunteer initiatives
- Development or enhancement of continuity of operations and continuity of government plans
- Conducting vulnerability assessments
- Planning resources and templates available at the Department of Homeland Security's *Lessons Learned Information Sharing (LLIS.gov)* portal

# Training

- Comprehensive training programs to develop individual and community capacity for complex, multiple/all-hazards threats
- Training based on professional standards, conducted in residence, on-site, or through distance education
- Training facilities and courses offered through National Domestic Preparedness Consortium
- Provide grant funds to institutionalize training at the State level
- Coordinated development of new courses through the Competitive Training Grant Program and our existing training academies
- Develop a Performance-Based Training, Exercise, and Evaluation Management System

# Exercises

- Assist in design, development, conduct, and evaluation of terrorism exercises
- Exercise grant funding and direct support to States to establish exercise programs and conduct exercises
- National Exercise Program, including:
  - Top Officials (TOPOFF) Exercise Series
  - Regional Exercise Program
  - National Special Security Event (NSSE) Exercise Program
  - Direct Exercise Support
  - Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program (HSEEP)
- Coordinate with Federal, State, and local partners to implement performance and threat-based, peer-evaluated National Exercise Program (NEP)
