








Unified Command

- A Unified Command was established between the FWC and U.S. Coast Guard on October 22, 2018. Demobilized January 26, 2019.
- Unified Command necessary to expedite the removal of displaced vessels in Bay, Gulf, Franklin and Wakulla counties
- Prioritizing the removal of vessels based on potential environmental impact with NOAA and SSCs.








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Vessel Removal Protocol



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




Data Imagery and Analysis

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- Initial NOAA imagery identified more than 1300 potential displaced vessels to be validated and assed by Unified Command response teams
- Over 100 personnel from state and federal agencies are involved
- One Transition Point and one Storage location established in Bay County contracted by FL.





NOTICE TO THE OWNER AND ALL PERSONS INTERESTED IN THE PROPERTY (VESSEL) DESCRIBED HEREIN. The following property (vessel), to wit:

was unlawfully upon public property known as

but it was moved and staged to the following location for navigational and safety reasons in compliance with Florida Statutes:

This vessel must be removed within 21 days; otherwise, it will be removed and disposed of pursuant to chapter 705, Florida Statutes.

You have been identified as the last known owner or responsible party for the above described vessel, which the undersigned law enforcement officer of the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) has determined to be derelict as defined in section 823.11, Florida Statutes.

The facts upon which FWC has made the determination that the vessel described above is derelict are as follows:

Sections 376.15 and 823.11, Florida Statutes, make it unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to store, leave, or abandon any derelict vessel on the public waters of the State.

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Subsection 705.101(3), Florida Statutes, defines all derelict vessels as abandoned property. Sections 376.15, 705.103, and 823.11, Florida Statutes, authorize law enforcement to remove or cause to be removed any derelict vessel from the public waters of the State and to destroy it.

In accordance with the above legislative mandate, FWC hereby orders you as the last known owner or party responsible for this vessel to claim this vessel within 21 days or to provide proof that legal

- In anticipation of the arrival of Hurricane Michael to Florida, the President of the United States declared a state of emergency for the State of Florida and the Florida Governor declared a state of emergency in the following counties, Escambia, Santa Rosa, Okaloosa, Walton, Holmes, Washington, Bay, Jackson, Calhoun, Gulf, Gadsden, Liberty, Franklin, Leon, Wakulla, Jefferson, Madison, Taylor, Hamilton, Suwannee, Lafayette, Dixie, Columbia, Gilchrist, Levy, Citrus, Baker, Union, Bradford, Alachua, Hernando, Pasco, Pinellas, Hillsborough, and Manatee counties. The Governor further issued Executive Order 18-277 to enable State and local governments to prepare for and respond to the impacts of Hurricane Michael.
- 2. Following Hurricane Michael's passing near and over the State of Florida in October 2018, vessels were damaged and in many cases sunken in public waters of the State. State and Federal governmental entities undertook to remove these vessels to eliminate the danger they posed to public safety, the environment, navigation, and personal property. These vessels would otherwise have remained sunken and derelict pursuant to section 823.11, Florida Statutes, and the owner or insurer would have



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So You Think You Could Have an ESF-10 Response

- Of about 1,000 vessels....
 - 50% will be removed via vessel owners
 - 25% will be removed by insured facilities (marinas)
 - Still leaves at least 250 sunken, submerged, displaced, abandoned and derelict vessels...









- Federal Response (NCP)

- Pre-designated On-Scene Coordinator/Lead Agency for oil spills/hazardous substances
- USCG Vessel Removal must be approved by COMDT
- Funding RP/OSLTF/CERCLA
- Federal to State (NRF)
 - Resource Request Form and Mission Assignment
 - Removal of oi/HAZMAT/vessels under Lead Agency IAQ law/reg/policy (Abandoned and Derelict Vessels)
 - Stafford Act
- Federal to Federal
 - Interagency agreement or Mission Assignment
 - Stafford Act cannot fund response on Federal Lands

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What You Need to Think About....

- Abandoned and Derelict Vessel Legal Framework

- Do you have one? What are the limitations?
- You may have has 10-20 of these in your port before the disaster..... You may have THOUSANDS following the disaster.....

- Additional Authorities to Potentially use

- Vessel registration requirements
- Environmental Protection
- State Land Regulations

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What You Need to Think About

Cost Share

- 0% versus 10% versus 25% MA cost share
- What are your (the State's) priorities?
 - Remove all vessels?
 - Only remove pollution threats?
 - Remove vessels in Environmentally Sensitive Areas?
 - Remove uninsured vessels?
 - What are the future impacts of not removing all vessels?



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Other issues



- Vessels may be on Federal or Tribal lands
- Vessels on private property
- Vessels with no clear owner
- Vessels/Owners with illicit histories
- Vessels that were derelict before the storm and impacted after
- Designated Staging Areas of Transition Points
- "Unicorns"
 - Vessels in area with explosive ordnance...also on CERCLA sites....it happened....

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So What Can You Do Now?

- Review your ADV authorities and processes
- Develop an ESF-10 Vessel Mitigation and Removal Protocol/Plan Template
 - Outline Authorities
 - Vessel Removal Priorities
 - Data Collection/Management Process
 - Owner Notification Process
 - Vessel Pollution Response and/or Removal Process
 - Identify Staging Areas or Transition Points
- Conduct a tabletop or drill with your partners
- Draft or update ADV Guidance in your ACP




